The Master of Science in Conflict Management and Resolution (MS-CMR) prepares students to understand and tranform interpersonal, group, organizational, community, and system-level conflict in a variety of contexts.

Our multidisciplinary approach to engaging with conflict fosters creative and effective approaches to seemingly intractable situations. Through ongoing experimentation, simulation and practice, students gain skills in conflict analysis, negotiation, mediation, facilitation and dialogue.

The 30-unit MS-CMR program can be completed in 15 months (full-time) or 9 months (accelerated). Flexible, part-time options are also available. Graduates have come from around the world and a wide range of educational backgrounds and professional disciplines including non-profits, government agencies, advocacy organizations, the military, the arts, media, science and education. This diversity provides a range of perspectives, encourages empathy and stimulates creative problem solving.
